Musical Cousins: Jazz and Bluegrass at CCM



Both jazz and bluegrass music, two American genres, awaken emotions, create an experience and feature improvisation. They can be rhythmic and follow a pattern or turn the musical encounter upside down and be quite unpredictable. Bluegrass tells you a story, and makes you tap your foot, while jazz makes you sway and evokes many different impressions and feelings. Jazz originated in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries in the African-American communities in New Orleans while bluegrass came later in the late 1930's – 40's. CCM faculty lan Goldstein calls jazz the quintessential American genre—its harmonically interesting and complex. It provides ample opportunity to improvise with engaging, beautiful chord changes, which allows for artistic expression.

Bluegrass is a thoroughly mixed genre with a dose of folk, country, old-time and blues. Ian reminds us that it is an American invention. Bill Munroe, known as the *Father of Bluegrass*, experimented with his country band and its sound. According to the Bluegrass Heritage Foundation, he created a hard-driving and powerful sound that used traditional acoustic instruments and featured distinctive vocal harmonies. To create this new music genre, Munroe chose the mandolin, banjo, fiddle, guitar, and bass. These continue to be the typical bluegrass instruments, contrary to jazz, which also include brass and percussion. Bluegrass involves improvising with melodies though with much simpler chord changes than jazz.

Exposure to both genres is great for young musicians and teaches them valuable skills. CCM saxophone faculty Tsuyoshi Honjo believes that students should learn the jazz basics to build upon. "Some people often believe that innovation is the main part of jazz but without tradition, it would lack the depth in the music. It is actually the same as with classical music", explains Tsuyoshi. Learning the basics and essential skills for any genre is important. According to Ian, "these genres are fun to learn, provide a sense of the wider world, and allow

them to progress. Students can see which genre speaks to them to delve deeper into or they may choose not to be defined by only one. *Why not try both?*

# CCM Student Elizabeth Howard accepted to the MMEA Eastern Junior District Band


