Ever wondered why you should take a workshop or a masterclass? Think: upping your music game. Workshops and masterclasses at CCM are group learning events, where either CCM faculty or visiting artists share their tips and tricks on a wide range of subjects. From broad topics such as "What Makes Music, Music?" to the intricacies of violin vibrato or improvisation, there's always something new and exciting to be worked on that can't necessarily be covered in private lessons. Workshops are a great way to explore musical interests outside of your chosen instrument and to try new things. Almost more important than the topic of each class is the learning environment.

Masterclasses are a chance to practice and receive feedback from a fresh perspective. Learning music isn't formulaic; there are many ways to teach and many ways to understand how to perform, how to compose, and how to listen. Learning from a variety of teachers fosters a more in-depth education, but it's not just the teachers who matter. Studies show that students who work in a group reach greater individual achievement than those who work alone (Johnson, 2014). Workshops foster ideation and in turn motivate students to achieve and progress.
