My Summer Experience by Anthony Valeri, Age 12

I have been playing violin for four years and have been studying with Angel Valchinov at CCM for all of them. I believe that if not for the way he has pushed me to my limit and inspired me, none of what I am about to tell you would have happened.

Last winter, Mr. Valchinov told me that he would be the string director of a prestigious festival for musicians called the Atlantic Music Festival. He encouraged me to submit an audition, so I played my best. My parents were forthright with me, letting me know it was unlikely that I would be accepted into a festival intended for highly skilled, college-aged musicians. They said that the audition process alone was a good learning experience. Then, one great night, my mom came into my room and told me that I had been accepted. I was amazed and excited to begin this incredible chapter in my life.

Soon the day dawned that we were to drive to the festival, which would be held at Colby College in Waterville, Maine. Once we arrived, I was amazed by how beautiful the campus was. We signed in quickly and hurried over to my first lesson. I had thought it would be very formal, and the teacher would be stern and strict; it turned out I was only half right. The lesson was formal but the teacher, Moni Simeonov, was a tall man from Bulgaria with a warm, humorous voice and an air of control. He showed me practice techniques I had never dreamed of and helped me to think of things in a different way. When it was done, my head was full of new ideas and I was eager for more.



After the lesson, my mom and I found my dorm. My mom and siblings would be sleeping in a rented house in town and were expecting me to stay with them, but I expressed my wishes to try to stay at the college like the rest of the festival attendees. I was given a single dorm since I was so much younger than everyone else.

My life at Colby College was different from my normal life in many ways. I had to set an alarm every night and, having hardly ever used a phone before, and I needed to use one every day. Most days I set my alarm for 7 am, rode my bike from my dorm to the dining hall where I ate breakfast, and then attended my first class of the day.

I met many impressive musicians at AMF. I found time between classes to practice on my own and with other musicians. We attended many lectures; one of my favorites was on saving time, led by Mr. Simeonov. There were concerts every night, and I had the honor of performing with amazing

musicians. I was really busy most days but between classes, I would say hi to my siblings as they were riding their bikes around campus. I made some awesome friends and would eat lunch and dinner with them at the dining hall. I had to be more self-reliant than I was used to, but I was in my element: surrounded by classical musicians.

The final day was there before I knew it. I played Frisbee with some of the friends I had met, and that night watched the orchestra perform. After the performance, I packed up my stuff and my mom drove me home. My head was filled with inspiration from all that I had learned. That was one of my favorite summers ever and I hope to have many more.

P.S. I only slept in the Airbnb with my mom and siblings one night because I wanted to see it.
